**SCHOLARSHIP ON SUDAN:
UNIVERSITY PRESSES EXPAND PUBLIC RESOURCE**

*"Books for Understanding: Sudan" Bibliography
Guides Librarians, Journalists, and Researchers to Valuable Scholarship*

NEW YORK (May 11, 2006) — For decades Sudan has been torn apart by regional, ethnic, and religious conflicts and battered by humanitarian disasters. When a historic power-sharing truce was signed between the north and south in the summer of 2005, the long-simmering rebellion in the western region of Darfur came to a boil. The peace deal signed in early May 2006 in Abuja, Nigeria, between the Sudanese government and several rebel groups is only a small step to resolving the massive crisis that has enveloped the citizens of Darfur.

Books for Understanding offers a wealth of scholarly resources on Sudan, Darfur, and the global and historical contexts of genocide and humanitarian intervention that provide background to the breaking news from Khartoum and the United Nations.
